 To be able to travel in a variety of different ways using a wide range of body parts. To be able to use gymnastic apparatus to balance and climb. To be able to link some movements together when performing a small range of skills. To be able to use large and small motor skills to do things independently, for example attempts to do zips, and pour drinks. To be able to develop increased control over their bodies and a desire to communicate through mark making and a recognition of pattern. To be able to experiment with wide range of small equipment to build hand and finger strength and hand and eye co-ordination. 	 To be able to manipulate and play with different materials using various tools like scissors, cutters, hammers. To be able to begin to build up and act out a repertoire of different role play experiences e.g., shop, vet, doctors. To be able to begin to use representation to communicate, e.g., drawing a line and saying, 'That's me'. To be able to s sounds by banging, shaking, tapping or blowing. To be able to explore sound through singing, movement and instrumental work.

Literacy

The children will be learning the following:

-To be able to join in with songs and rhymes, copying sounds, such as loud, quiet, fast, slow, using instruments.

-To be able to add some marks to their drawings, which they give meaning to. For example: That says mummy.

-To be able to develop play around favourite stories using props.

-To be able to ask questions about the book. Makes comments and shares their own ideas.

-To be able to enjoy drawing freely.

Important Information

Nursery rhymes/songs

It is really important at this young age that the children are exposed to lots of language and singing can help with this. We hope that you will support your child at home with songs around the theme 'All about me".

Song suggestions:

-Five Senses -Hello my Body -Funny Bones -Mummy Daddy, Mummy -My family

Toilet training

Many parents toilet trained their children during the holiday, so there is plenty of time for your child to grow into this skill. However, if your child is showing no signs of toilet training, please talk to your child's key worker to discuss how we will proceed in the classroom and how we can work together to assist your child and you. With a similar approach at home and at school, it is so much easier on the child and the success rate increases. We ask parents of children in pull ups to please dress your child in clothing that accommodates toileting, such as two-piece outfits **without baby vest, belts or shoulder straps**. Our desire is to help each child reach their fullest potential in all areas of development including independent toileting.

Reminders

Please ensure that the children are wearing suitable footwear and are not wearing their 'best' clothes, as Nursery activities can be messy. Please also label all clothing and bring a spare set of clothing daily.

As the weather is changing, please ensure that your child has a coat, hat, scarf, gloves if possible, and Wellington boots for rainy days as we go outside daily.

By the end of the unit, it is hoped that your child would have achieved all of their learning targets. If you have any comments or questions about your child's learning, please do not hesitate to get in touch.
